World Hindi Day 2025: Date and History

Ladies and Gentleman,

Vishwa Hindi Divas, or World Hindi Day, is celebrated every year on January 10, and this year, it will be observed on Friday, January 10, 2025.

This special day is observed to raise awareness about the Hindi language and to promote its status as a global means of communication.

It commemorates the historic moment when, in 1949, Hindi was first spoken in the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), followed by the first World Hindi Conference inaugurated in 1975 by then-Prime Minister, Srimati Indira Gandhi.

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There are currently over 7,000 languages, each with its distinctive features.

Hindi is the third most spoken language in the world, after English and Mandarin Chinese.

All of this sends a clear message: if we want the language to progress, we must not limit ourselves to organizing activities for those who can read, speak and write Hindi only.

We must reach out to those who cannot do so, beyond social barriers.

We must pay special attention to our children and our youths to spark their interest and love for this language.

Our pedagogy must evolve. In the digital age, it is imperative that Teaching and Learning methodologies adapt with new technology.

Let there be greater visibility of the work you are doing. Let people know what all you are doing.

This is also a world full of competition. If you don't tell people regularly of the work that you do, people do not notice.

Government will continue to offer all its support to your mission.

Not only do we share extremely strong and collaborative historic, political and cultural ties with India, but we also work closely with major international organizations dedicated to the promotion of Hindi.

As we gather today in a spirit of reflection and determination, let us come together to preserve and promote Hindi as a global medium of communication and as a powerful contributor to global peace, harmony and unity.
