Allow me to share a personal note with you:

Before becoming President, I spent many years as an academic at the University of Mauritius, where I served as a lecturer and the Dean of faculty. I was also Minister of Education and Minister of Industry.

So I have always stayed connected with the heart, hope, struggles, dreams and voices of our youth.

As President of the Republic, I am now the new Patron of the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award in Mauritius.

I must say that I am fully conscious of the depth of transformation it offers—not only to participants, but also to those who witness its impact.

Today, I see in you, ambassadors of positive change: In a world where values can sometimes feel eroded, you are leading by example and are encouraging others to follow in order to make a difference in our communities.

Navigating complexities of Digital Age

However, as you are aware, the upcoming generation faces the pressure of navigating rapid technological shifts, economic changes, environmental challenges and social expectations all at once

In fact, a recent report from the World Economic Forum states that:

"The world's 1.2 billion young people – 16% of the global population – stand at a crossroads. They face a future shaped by relentless technological upheavals, economic turbulence and an evolving social fabric that demands more from them than any generation before. In a world more connected than ever, their struggles are both uniquely personal and profoundly global." (World Economic Forum, March, 2025)

And these pressures are real, often leading to serious consequences:

Mental health challenges, cyber-crimes such as online bullying, harassment, revenge pornography, crypto fraud, lack of emotional regulation; loneliness, substance abuse.

Our collective challenge in this new world order thus remains to navigate with confidence, resilience, compassion and courage and to ensure that humanity survives and thrives. We must embrace digital transformation, but always remember that while technical and digital skills will always matter, what will matter even more are the qualities that Chat GPT, Deepseek or Robots cannot replace: conscience, humanity, character, integrity, creativity and resilience.

In the age of AI and Artificial Super Intelligence, Emotional Intelligence and Spiritual Intelligence must never lose their value.

So it is imperative that we integrate the vision that this programme carries into our broader youth development strategy.

This is particularly important as the world you are growing into is complex.

While it offers incredible tools and opportunities, it also has new forms of stress and uncertainty.

Government Programme 2025-2029

You all remember that on January 24, 2025, I had the honour of presenting the Government Programme 2025-2029 that seeks to provide a bridge to a better, brighter future for our youths.

Government has already reiterated its commitment to launch a Youth Empowerment Programme so that our youngsters are not just jobready, but life-ready.

Government will also promote cultural awareness, to encourage our youth to express their voices and explore their artistic paths.

You are already proving that such development is possible.

I urge you to carry forward the lessons you've learned. Let them shape your careers, your communities, and your country.
