As President of the Republic, my main mission is nation building, and this mission must be fulfilled with the active support, involvement and inclusion of all sections of our population.

Our Sino-Mauritian community has played and continues to play an essential role in shaping the identity of Mauritius.

In fact, this very morning, I inaugurated a library – the first children and youth reading space in Chinatown- by the Soong Chin Ling (Mauritius) Foundation.

A project made possible through the invaluable contribution of the youth and the support community members in Chinatown.

So, your contributions to our cultural, economic, and social spheres are immeasurable.

And such initiatives are pivotal in consolidating our national pride and identity as Mauritians, as well as offering a true reflection of the spirit

of our Republic – one that showcases the beauty of our peaceful coexistence, genuine cohesion and intercultural celebration.

A Call for Unity in Diversity

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Today's world –shaped by divisions and conflict- must compel us to look at powerful tools of diplomacy and remind ourselves that what unites us is stronger than what divides us.

In these times, tea, porcelain, art and music are here to show us that beauty and understanding often lie in the simple things.

This evening, marked by demonstrations of traditional Chinese teamaking, ancient porcelain craftsmanship, and Chinese music, is therefore an invitation to foster intercultural dialogue, honour traditions that bind communities, and to reaffirm our commitment to unity, both as a nation and as part of the global family.

It is essential that we celebrate the richness of our heritage and look to the future with hope, guided by the wisdom of generational values.
