Introduction

making, and opens the doors for both personal and professional development and growth.

I am confident that this International University and Career Expo will provide valuable opportunities for students to encounter diversity, broaden their outlook, and develop the flexibility and adaptability increasingly required to navigate a world full of uncertainty and unpredictability.

Context and Education

Ladies and Gentlemen

As you are aware, the world is going through fundamental transformation of all fronts-political, economic, social, technological, ecological and cultural.

We are witnessing an exponential growth of knowledge, while the shelf life of existing knowledge keeps on shrinking.

Technological innovations have become pervasive.

The very purpose of education and the way we educate ourselves is no longer the same as in the past.

The way we teach and learn is changing dramatically.

Covid-19 accelerated the pace of distance and on-line learning and transformed the brick and mortar educational institutions into virtual learning spaces. Chat GPT and the latest versions of AI **are** transforming the education ecosystem and the world of work

Acquiring knowledge and skills for lifelong employment is no longer the end purpose of education. Rather, the way forward now is lifelong

learning and flexibility and mobility as far as career progression and growth is concerned.

Against this backdrop, it has become imperative to rethink not only where education occurs, but what education must now become. And to recalibrate educational policies and strategies.

Perspective

As you may be aware, this is the second year of my mandate as President of the Republic, and I continue to draw deeply from my experience as an academic and as former Minister of Education -

A perspective that informs my understanding of the transformative power of education and its central role in shaping both individuals and our nation.

“Education is not preparation for life; education is life itself.”

These timeless words of the American philosopher and educational reformer John Dewey invites us to reflect deeply on why we should undertake higher studies.

It is important to view our educational journey not as a transient phase confined to classrooms and examinations, but as a continuous human process through which we can shape identity, cultivate judgement, and participate meaningfully in society.

We must also keep in view the impact of the latest versions of AI and constantly evaluate its ramifications for the job market. Volatility, uncertainty, complexity, ambiguity and flexibility are some of the inescapable features of the emerging job markets which we will have to incorporate in our decision-making algorithm.

In my media intervention on the 2025 HSC results this week, I emphasised that university education must extend beyond formal degrees.

It should cultivate critical thinking, emotional and spiritual intelligence, creativity, ethics, values, and the capacity to contribute meaningfully to society.

Whether our young adults study locally or abroad, they will face a world marked by division and fragmentation, transnational loyalties, and rapidly evolving technologies.

Social media has heightened awareness of conflicts and increased empathy, yet cybercrime, online gender-based violence, and revenge porn are on the rise due to Artificial Intelligence - leading to mental health crises and suicide among the student community.

Education must therefore go beyond content delivery encompass a wider mission involving critical thinking, ethical judgement, character formation, judgement, moral awareness, informed agency and community engagement - qualities not found on transcripts but essential to thrive in a world that is increasingly interconnected yet fractured.

Spirit

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is in this spirit that I address you this evening.

I am happy to note that our youth are becoming aware of the new realities of our changing world, which is reflected in the wise words of one of our new laureates, Shaivi Boodhun, who made this thoughtful comment:

“Il ne faut jamais laisser une machine penser à sa place. »

This is precisely why, at the Presidency, we want to accompany the younger generation

In this respect we initiated two innovative projects:

The **National Essay Competition** and the **Learn-AI Innovation Challenge** - designed to encourage students across our Republic to participate in nation-building, engage with contemporary societal challenges, and explore the responsible use of technology for the common good.

These are two highly successful projects that I pioneered last year. These projects are intended to engage students in expanding their educational horizons and perspectives of life.

I call upon all educational institutions and their leaders to fully embrace their profound responsibility in preparing our students for the complex realities of the 21st century; to cultivate not only knowledge, but interdisciplinary understanding and holistic, life-long learning.

I understand that this International University and Career Expo is an annual fundraising event of the Rotary Club of Grand Baie, which, for nearly three decades, has built enduring bridges between aspiration and opportunity, knowledge and purpose, local ambition and global possibility.

I am confident that the Rotary Club of Grand Baie will continue to foster meaningful engagement between education and communities.
